Rechartering Tips and Guidelines

A note from the Pine Tree Council Registrar for Re-chartering your unit:

I wanted to take the opportunity to help your unit with the annual re-chartering of your Pack, Troop, or Crew. I have included some tips and guidelines for you to follow.

- Executive Officer (IH) does not pay a fee.
- Tiger Cub Adult Partner does not pay a fee.
- Tiger Cub Adult wanting to register for another position such as den leader or committee member must fill out an adult application.
- All required positions must be filled.

ALL UNITS MUST HAVE:

Executive Officer (IH)

Chartered Organization Representative (CR)

Committee Chairman (CC)

Two Committee Members (MC)

PACKS MUST ALSO HAVE:

Cubmaster

Den Leader

Webelos Leader

TROOPS MUST ALSO HAVE:

Scoutmaster

CREWS MUST ALSO HAVE:

Crew Advisor

- Executive Officer must sign the front of the charter.
- Unit Leader (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Crew Advisor) must sign on the last page of the charter.
- Addresses and phone numbers should be checked for ALL persons on the charter.
- Training status should be updated on the charter. If the charter says N for trained but the person is trained, the N should be changed to a Y and the type of training and date should be written beside the Y. We cannot change the N to a Y without the date.
- If a person is not paying in this unit because they are already registered elsewhere in the council, circle the position and indicate the unit that they pay their dues in.
- Double-check the math. The \$20.00 charter fee is often left out of the total because it is printed and therefore missed when adding the column of figures that have been written in.
- Tiger Cubs listed on an overflow sheet need to have an adult partner listed on an overflow sheet also.
- Grades should be checked and updated on the charter.
- Ranks will automatically get updated when advancement is turned in. Scouts who have not advanced since 9/99 will probably have the wrong rank listed. The only way to change this is to attach a copy of the advancement form showing the correct rank.
- There is no longer an ID number. Most new applicants are found in scoutnet by their social security number. All others are found by name and address only. The old ID number has been removed from the system.

2002 Friends of Scouting Campaign



Camp Hinds 75th Anniversary Adams Scout History Museum

We are pleased to recognize **Bill and Elizabeth Adams**, long time supporters of Camp Hinds and the
Pine Tree Council, with the new **Adams Scout History Museum at Camp Hinds.** The Adams Scout History
Museum will be located in the center room of the Rec
Hall at Camp Hinds and will feature Camp Hind's
memorabilia from the past 75 years.

Bill Adams, now retired, worked as an architectural engineer and served many years on the Pine Tree Council Property Committee. A major force behind many of the buildings and projects at Camp Hinds, Bill helped design and draw up the plans for the restructuring of the Rec Hall, the Konecki Health Lodge, the dining hall addition, the remodeling of the Training Center kitchen and the plumbing plans for the new shower houses.

The Adams family has been a long time financial supporter of camp and the major donor of funds for the Hinds COPE course and the new Training Center kitchen. Bill also helped secure other donations for the Training Center kitchen.

The Adams Scout History Museum will feature 75 years at Camp Hinds. On display will be a collection of camp patches, t-shirts, hats, mugs as well as stories and photographs of camp. It is fitting that the museum will be located in the Rec Hall as that building was there when camp opened in 1927. The building was a large one-room structure with a stage at one end.


In the 1960s, when the building was found to have major structural problems and rotten sills, camp volunteers were called upon to fix the problems. Bill Adams designed a system to reinforce the structure of the roof and carrying beams in the building. Walls were added to create the camp office and trading post and volunteers laid down the hardwood flooring that was left over from the donated wood for the Training Center.

Camp Hinds and Pine Tree Council are pleased to recognize the Adams family for their contributions to camp and for the special memories that their gifts have provided to the Scouts who have attended Camp Hinds.



Scout Sunday

Scout Sunday will take place on Sunday, February 3, 2002. The Boy Scouts of America has designated Scout Sunday as the primary date to recognize the contributions of young people and adults to Scouting. If this date is not viable, it is permissible for a Chartered Organization to celebrate on the Sunday most acceptable to the Pastor and Congregation.



The following are some

recommendations for a Scout Sunday Worship Service. When planning a worship service for Scout Sunday, strive to involve Scouts who are church members. Youth members should be used to sing, usher, greet, pray, and read. Occasionally a youth is allowed to prepare the sermon for the service.

At the very least, have the worship committee and the pastor select a date and announce that all members involved in Scouting should wear their uniforms. In turn, each member should be recognized for leadership to others.

Most Churches plan worship services in advance, so requesting consideration for a Scout Sunday observance ahead of time might be more successful.

Eagle Scout Court of Honor, Who is Responsible for Them?

Since becoming the District Executive for York District, I have had the pleasure of attending a few Eagle Scout Court of Honor Ceremonies. Recently, someone asked me who is responsible for the Eagle Scout Ceremony. Is it the Eagle Scout's family, the Scout's Troop or is it a combination of both?

The answer depends on the policies determined by the troop committee. Ideally, the ceremony should be developed by the troop committee, Eagle Scout's family and of course the Eagle Scout himself. The Eagle Scout Ceremony can be as simple as the awarding of the Eagle Scout Award at a Troop Court of Honor or at a separate ceremony, which may include a dinner. Of course, if the parties involved choose to include a dinner, they must determine who should prepare and pay for the dinner for the ceremony.

An important point to remember is that very few young men achieve the Eagle Scout Rank and, in many cases, this is the first significant achievement a young man attains in his life. The Eagle Scout Rank has also been a combined effort of the Eagle Scout, his parents, the troop volunteers and the scouts of the troop. The ceremony should reflect the combined effort that goes into attaining the award. The more people involved in the ceremony, the more special the ceremony becomes. These special events may encourage younger scouts to work hard and strive to be an Eagle Scout. Resources for Eagle Scout ceremonies are as close as a click of the computer mouse button.
