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James E. West Fellowship Program

James E. West was the first Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, and he served in that position for more than three decades. The James E. West Fellowship award is available for gifts of \$1,000 and up in cash or marketable securities to our council endowment fund. The gift must be in addition to – and not replace or diminish— the donor's annual Friends of Scouting support. Many individuals and corporations make these gifts either on behalf of someone else – such as in honor of an Eagle Scout, Silver Beaver recipient, a retirement, a special accomplishment or anniversary – or in memory of a special individual. Remember, Cub Scout Packs and Boy Scout Troops can honor a fellow Eagle Scout, the Scout Master, or a special Scouting supporter. If an institution is truly "the lengthened shadow of one man," it is more than fitting that the Boy Scouts of America honor James E. West's significant contributions to Scouting in such a significant way.

Encouraging gifts to the Pine Tree Council endowment fund is one of our highest priorities. The need to expand the current endowment underscores the Pine Tree Council's commitment to providing quality Scouting programs for young people in the years to come and underlines the Boy Scout Motto of "Be Prepared."

The James E. West Fellowship award is an attractive 8"x10" framed certificate, personalized with the donor's name, date of gift, and Council name. In addition, there is an embroidered square knot for uniform wear. While it is a national recognition, the James E. West Fellowship award is authorized and presented by the Pine Tree Council. All contributions stay within the Pine Tree Council endowment trust fund.

All James E. West Fellowship award recipients will be invited to participate in the various endowment recognition programs, such as the Heritage Society Event to be held October 3, 2002 at Lookout Point in Lincolnville. This event will honor and recognize the Heritage Society members.

Medical Forms For Summer Camp Which One Do I Need?

All of our camp programs require health forms for every camper, parent, staff and leader attending camp. Camp programs require specific forms according to BSA Standards and the State of Maine camp rules! Here are some helpful reminders for health forms!

FunPack Weekends – All adult and youth participants need a Class I health form.

Day Camps- All youth and leaders attending need a Class I health form.

WEBELOS Resident Camp

All youth and *leaders need a Class I and II health form.
 Adults over the age of 40 need a Class III. Please note- that even though the BSA Class II form says it is for camp stays of over 72 hours - All Webelos still need it completed - as the State of Maine camp rules require the Class II form.

Boy Scout resident camp at Hinds and Bomazeen- All youth and *leaders need a Class I and Class II health form. Adults over 40 need a Class III.

High Adventure Programs at Hinds and Bomazeen (includes SCUBA, Canoeing and Kayaking Treks) – All participants must have a completed Class III health form which requires a doctor's physical within the last twelve months.

*Leaders staying in camp for less than 72 hours can use a Class I health form but will not be allowed to go swimming or use the boats

Class I health form includes a health history, immunization dates and parent/guardian signature (signed and dated within the last 12 months) for permission to treat in an emergency. No doctor's physical exam is needed.

Class II health form includes Class I information along with a doctor's physical exam done within the last three years of date of attending camp. Youth and adults (under age 40) can use this form.

Class III Health form includes health history, immunization dates, emergency permission to treat and doctors evaluation done within past 12 months of attending camp. This form is required for high adventure programs and for adults over the age of 40.

Please make sure that immunization dates are noted on all health forms. It is not acceptable under State of Maine camp rules and regulations to put "up to date."

Blank copies of health forms can be found in the back of the Pine Tree Council Calendar or on the council web page www.pinetreebsa.org

Your camp literature will tell you where to send your health forms. Please send your forms out so that they arrive at least two weeks prior to your arrival at camp. This allows the health officer time to preview the forms for missing signatures or information.

Please keep a copy for your unit records and bring an extra copy (photocopies are acceptable) with you to camp to be prepared for late mail or missing forms.

New Camp just for Cubs!

We need a place for our Cub Scouts and their families to go and enjoy camp in a special setting designed just to meet their program needs and size! As announced earlier this year, Pine Tree Council, B.S.A. has established a new committee to design and make plans for a new PTC camp just for our Cub Scouts and their families! The committee will meet over the next 18 months to provide ideas and leadership to the planning of the new cub camp, which is tentatively scheduled to open for the first phase in 2004.

This Cub Camp Committee is chaired by Michael King, a long time PTC Scouter who has served on the Executive Board, past Camping Committee Chair, Camp Hinds alumni and past Fun Pack Weekend Director. The Cub Camp Committee reports to the Outdoor Planning Committee and will pass on its recommendation to the Properties Committee and the Executive Board.

The committee is meeting monthly and looking for input from other Cub Scouters who have ideas or recommendations for a Cub Camp. The committee is looking at programs – both summer and off-season, facilities for the summer and off-season rentals and estimated cost and attendance levels. Conservation and Camping Reminder!

Drought Alert! You have been hearing through the news and media that Maine is in a severe drought – some of you may have even experienced it in your own homes with your wells running dry. The lack of rainfall and snow has also caused extreme dry conditions in the woods for this time of year and there are possible rumors of a fire ban to go in effect before the summer.

How does this affect our summer camps and camping programs? And what can we do as Scouts to help?

As of right now, Bob Gosselin, PTC Property Superintendent, reports that all of our camp wells have not had any issues. This may change if the drought continues much longer. If it does become an issue, water restrictions may be placed on our campers attending camp! While hiking and camping out, be cautious when using water from an unapproved source. Always use an approved drinking water filtration or sanitation system to purify any drinking or cooking water.

As Scouts and Scouters, we have always practiced care with fires in the woods! This is even more critical now! Please use extreme care and follow all safety rules when camping out! By law, the only fire that does not need a fire

Pine Tree Council Camp News



As a continuation of our series of articles regarding Camp Hinds and her 75th Anniversary, we would like to look at the Order of the Arrow. Madockawanda Lodge came into existence on July 10, 1944, when the first seven members were inducted into the Order of the Arrow at Camp Hinds. One of the seven was Frank W.P. Bailey, one of the founders of Camp Hinds and a 30-year staff member. At that time, the Lodge took the name Madockawanda, based upon a story told by Uncle Frank about the great Indian chief, Madockawanda, who unified the Penobscot nation.

As a part of their ordeal, these candidates were directed to prepare a Ceremonial area on the hill just south of the present Cadigan Lodge, and to construct an altar fireplace and ceremonial altar. The snapping turtle was taken as the totem of our Lodge, and the clap 1, 1-2 as our lodge clap.

During that early period, Ordeals (inductions) were held every two weeks during the summer camp season. As elections began to be held in the home unit, the need for summertime ordeals diminished. Gradually, the ordeal schedule developed into its present day form, with ordeal weekends in the spring and fall.

Over its 58-year history, Madockawanda has performed tens of thousands of hours of service to Camp Hinds. The Lodge regularly provides cheerful service and helps in the upkeep of camp buildings, general maintenance and repair and performs many other service functions, including varied ceremonial work. In addition, the Lodge has performed several significant projects for the Camp. These include rebuilding the council ring (which now bears the Lodge name), building the deck on the Dining Hall, replacing the stairs to the Tenny Bridge and, most recently, the complete renovation of the Waterfront area.

A tip of the Purple Hat to all Lodge members who, over the years, have worked and toiled for many long hours to help make Camp Hinds what it is today!

Have you heard about B.S.A.'s best kept secret?

This is the <u>premier</u> and highest level of adult leader training in the Boy Scouts of America. Wood Badge won't teach you how to tie knots, won't teach you how to rub two sticks together to start fires, and won't teach you how to find your way with a compass. What it does teach you is how to be the most effective and best leader that you can be. Wood Badge is the highest level of <u>leadership skill</u> training offered for all adult leaders in the Scouting program. The skills that you will learn in the Wood Badge Course will assist you in more successfully operating your Pack, Troop, Post, or Crew. It will also carry over into your non-scouting lives by making you more successful leaders in your family, church, work and might even help in dealing with your spouse.

Any registered adult leader in any role in the scouting program is eligible to take the course. The prerequisites are that you have never taken a Wood Badge course in the past; that you are registered in good standing with the BSA; and that you have completed the Basic Leader Training course for your primary registered position. There is no tenure or time requirement.

The next Wood Badge course is being offered this fall. The dates are September 13, 14, 15 and October 11, 12 13. The cost is \$160.00. This is less than a week at summer camp. It does require that you be in attendance all day on two Fridays. You will have to make arrangements for these days to be available to you. If you are interested in participating in this truly great Wood Badge experience, you must request that an invitation be sent to you! This request for an invitation must include your name, address, telephone number, your BSA role title (ie: Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Post Advisor, Crew Advisor, etc.), and your district name. This request must be given or sent to Bill Coffin at 47 Mark Street, Lewiston, ME 04240. Upon receiving your request, you will be sent an invitation with all of the details regarding the course. If you are still interested, you must fill out the application and send it back with a \$25.00 deposit. This deposit will hold your spot in the course until July 1. By July 1, the full course fee of \$160.00 must be paid in full or your slot will be filled on a first come first served basis. There are only 48 openings on a Wood Badge course, so I remind you that the "early bird catches the worm". Don't be left out of the course, send in your application today. Never assume this course to be full, only Bill Coffin knows for sure.

permit from the local authorities is a small cooking fire. Any other campfire does need a permit! If you are camping in an established campground or park, check with the operators to see if you need to secure a permit before you start your evening campfire! If you are camping in a non-established area, obtain a permit with local authorities.

As an extra precaution, use only established fire pit areas or above ground containers and make sure to clear a six foot perimeter of all combustible material around the fire. Have fire buckets filled with water readily available and put the fire out cold before leaving. Do not build bonfires or burn extra brush for enjoyment.

As Scouts we believe in the Outdoor Code! Lets all do our part and help Maine get through this dry season safely!
