## Weekend Camp Rental Policies

Pine Tree Council is proud to have five beautiful camps that are available for units, groups & districts to rent for their activities. Whether you need a campsite for a patrol or troop campout, a cabin for a den overnight, or the lodge for a weekend family event, we have the facilities! Everyone needs to be responsible when using the properties to assure that they are used correctly and are here for all to enjoy!

To help keep all units and leaders informed, here are some of the policies in place for using PTC properties.

Camp rentals reservations for Sept. 2004 - May 2005 start September 1, 2004. This allows council and district events the opportunity to book facilities before they are opened to the general Scouting public. Reservations for property usage are done through the Pine Tree Council.

 $\cdot$  A property use form must be filled out for all property usage. The application and accompanying fees must be received at the Council Office at least two weeks prior to the event.

 $\cdot$  Reservations for campsites and buildings need to be based on the listed capacity of the building or site. When we try to squeeze 60 people into a campsite designed for 30, it places added stress on the site. Also the fees are designed to reflect the cost of using the site at its set capacity.

Siblings and unregistered youth cannot attend - no exceptions!** In order to provide an equal opportunity for all of our Packs to participate in the Boston Museum trip, please follow the guidelines below.

#### Application Procedure

Each Pack must submit a deposit of \$10 for each person who plans to attend. Please send a check made payable to Pine Tree Council, along with the registration coupon below. Phone applications will not be accepted.

All applications must be received at the Pine Tree Council by the end of the business day on November 11, 2004. Please do not request reservations for more slots than you actually plan to use (for those who are selected, deposits are non-refundable.) A drawing will be held on November 12th . Those who were selected from the drawing will be notified, and the remaining payment and confirmation of number of participants (cannot exceed original allotment) will be due at the Pine Tree Council by January 12, 2005, end of business day. Any reserved slots not paid in full by this date will be lost and offered to those on the waiting list (again, the initial deposit is non-refundable.) Those Packs not selected will also be notified and deposits will be returned.

Once participants are confirmed, the Pine Tree Council is required to pay for those spaces. It is the policy of the Boston Museum of Science not to grant refunds to anyone who does not participate in the Camp-In, unless the MUSEUM cancels the event.

## Health & Safety Corner BE PREPARED FOR SAFE SCOUTING



Summer season is upon us and that means being outdoors, camping, hiking, fishing and enjoying the great State of Maine! It also means coming in contact with some unwanted pests! Help keep yourself and your Scouting families safe by being prepared

against ticks and mosquitoes that may carry diseases.

Lyme Disease is transmitted to humans by the deer tick, which is much smaller than the more commonly found wood ticks in Maine. Deer ticks are about the size of a pinhead.

Mosquitoes can transmit the West Nile Virus. To help avoid ticks and mosquitoes, here are some helpful hints:

- Avoid areas with standing water.
- Stay inside at dawn and dusk.
- Wear light colored clothing, long sleeves and long pants. Tuck pant legs into socks.
- Avoid strong smelling scented products when outdoors
- Inspect people, clothing and pets for ticks after outdoor activities.
- Use products with DEET. DEET is effective as a tick and mosquitoes repellent.
- Use it on skin that is exposed. Not on skin covered with clothing.
- Follow the directions on the labels.
- Do not spray near eyes or mouths.
- Wash treated skin with soap and water after returning indoors.

## All Out for Scouting

September 14th and 16th are this years All Out for Scouting registration dates. New youth and adult applications need to be turned in to the appropriate district location on September 16th. District training will be held to help your unit have a successful All Out for Scouting Recruitment Night sign-up. Information can and should be sent to your local newspaper, radio station, and television station for promotion of your recruitment night.

Look over the All Out For Scouting training materials that you will receive at your district training to make sure that you have a great night set up for the parents and the kids. Have as many registered leaders on hand as possible to answer questions and to help register new adults and kids in the program. Here are some reminders that will help you have a successful recruitment night:

1. Contact the Pine Tree Council by August 20th with your All Out for Scouting recruitment location and date of either September 14th or 16th. Please start your recruitment night at 6:30 PM to help with Council wide publicity information.

2. Work with other Packs and Troops in the same community so everyone recruits new kids and adults.

3. Talk to your local school about an in class promotion with the boys, a few days before the sign-up night, to build their enthusiasm.

4. Make sure that your local religious affiliation is aware of the nights because many will include this information in their worship service bulletins.

5. Talk with local businesses about placing information on their marquees promoting All Out for Scouting.

- 6. Place posters in stores and high traffic areas.
- 7. Some grocery stores will place a flyer in shopping bags.
- 8. Cable access stations will sometimes promote sign-up night.
- 9. Local phone companies will put info on their monthly bills.

10. Encourage your registered Cub Scouts to wear their uniform to school on the day of your All Out for Scouting event.

11. Invite a local Boy Scout Troop to help keep the kids entertained while you talk with the parents.

12. Have your treasurer attend your recruitment night sign-up so that one check with the correct pro-rated fees can be written to

the Pine Tree Council to avoid losing any money.

13. Make a great first impression by being organized.

14. Have a calendar of events for the new scout and their family so they are prepared for the upcoming activities.

15. All applications and appropriate pro-rated fees should be taken to the drop-off location on Thursday, September 16th unless other arrangements have been made with the District Executive.

16. Have fun and show new families the excitement of Scouting. 17. Before your new families leave the registration night, make sure they know the time, date, and location of your next scheduled den or pack meeting.

### **York District Scout in Action**

One goal of the scouting program is to prepare our youth for emergencies. I find it very heart warming and rewarding when I hear about one of our scouts helping out when the time arises and his scouting skills go into action. Here is another story about a York District Scout in Action.

On a Saturday in April, Alex Thacker, Cub Scout with Pack 356 in Wells, was working in the backyard with his family when a tree being cut down by his father hit a dead branch on another tree his father did not see. The dead branch fell and struck his father on the head. As Alex's mother went to help his father who was cut pretty seriously by the branch that fell, she called to Alex to run to the house and call 911. Alex called 911 and talked to the 911 operator and gave a full description of what had happened as well as their address. Alex then went out to the street to wait for the emergency vehicles to arrive. When they arrived, Alex directed the paramedics to where his father was lying. Alex's mom then asked Alex to take his younger sister and the dog into the house out of the way so the paramedics could take care of their father. Alex stayed with his sister and calmed her down as she was quite scared by the incident. Through the ordeal, Alex remained calm and took care of his sister, which allowed his mother to help out his father during the initial moments after the accident (when his mother was trying to stop the bleeding on his father's head), and also when the emergency vehicles arrived.

On the way to the hospital, the paramedic told Alex's father how impressed he was with Alex and that they should be very proud of how he handled himself by making the 911 call and directing them to the accident scene. At the hospital, Alex continued to watch over his sister while the doctors worked on putting 30 stitches over his father's eye, and it also allowed his mother to speak with the doctors. Both of Alex's parents are very proud of him and credit his Den Leader Maureen Dileo and the Cub Scout program for providing Alex the tools he needed to act responsibly as he did in his family's time of need. **Great Job Alex!!. We are all proud of you.**


